We had a 19 strong turn up for a tasty lunch at Leura Chinese Restaurant, and a few managed to make it to Sublime Point Lookout.


We welcome and look forward to working with **Bryn Hutchinson** who has joined our committee as assistant treasurer. Happy Winter Gardening ... **Lorraine**

AUSTRALIA'S MASTER GARDENER: Paul Sorensen and his gardens by Richard Ratcliffe.

This is a lavishly illustrated study of the life and works of Paul Sorensen the noted NSW garden designer. Ratcliffe examines Sorensen's character, the gardens he created and the philosophies which inspired his work. The book includes maps of some of his gardens, a list of trees typically found in his gardens, a comprehensive list of gardens which he designed, a bibliography and an index.

FROM OUR MEMBERS' GARDENS - A favourite of **Roz and Neil Sing** is their *Luculia pinceana Pink Spice* gifted to them by former LGC members, **Richard Langdon** and **Marilyn**



Hawkett, back in 2017. *Luculia pinceana* is not as well known as the more common and larger *Luculia gratissima* but it is worth searching for. It grows about 3m high and has beautiful compact, rosy pink tubular flowers in a tight head much like a hydrangea. The flowers have a very sweet, delicious musk-jasmine fragrance that can be smelled several metres away. It is frost tender to 5 degrees and is best grown in a warm sheltered position in filtered light in slightly acidic soil rich in organic material. It needs summer watering. It is an ideal addition to a garden where rhododendrons and camellias already successfully grow. Roz and Neil finally finally found a location for their Luculia after a couple of tries. It thrives under their oak next to rhododendrons. Roz worked on **Noel Roscoe's** advice, don't throw

out a plant until you have tried at least 3 locations. Roz reports it took a couple of years for the Luculia to forgive her after each shift as Luculias don't like to be moved.

The Luculia is in flower for about 6 weeks from late April providing colour in an otherwise dull spot in the garden during winter. So far the only pest problem has been an annual infestation of a leaf-roller caterpillar — a couple of sprays with Natrasoap 10 days apart is sufficient control.



Lorraine McMiles sent in a couple of photos of her maples. As we all know, it has been a particularly good year for colour. Why do leaves colour in autum? As night length increases, chlorophyll production slows down and then stops. Eventually all the chlorophyll is destroyed. The carotenoids and anthocyanin present in the leaf are then unmasked and show their colours. Best colour is produced when the weather is dry, sunny and cool. If it's a cloudy, damp year colour vibrancy suffers.
